Context Statement

Huntfield Heights School P-6 caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 78. Huntfield Heights School P-6 is classified as Category 2 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 26% Aboriginal students, 21% students with disabilities, 10% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 4% children/young people in care. Governing Council Report

2023 has been another fantastic year for our school, which includes the increase in the membership of the Governing Council.

Together with Sarah Cunningham, a fellow governing council member, we worked on establishing a playgroup at Huntfield Heights Primary School P-6. We received the support of Principal Cathryn Herbert and Teacher, Danielle Vigor, and collaborated with Amy Gill, the preschool teacher, to make use of the preschool space for the playgroup. Danielle provided us with the necessary information, including the ACECQA standards, as well as the policies and procedures for volunteers. Additionally, Danielle reached out to the Learning Together team on behalf of our group to seek assistance, assessment, support, and guidance during the following terms. Danielle also attended the Playgroup sessions with her 2 children and was there to offer her much appreciated support and guidance.

Deb from the Learning Together Team visited us during the playgroup sessions and offered her support and guidance. She mentored us on how to run the sessions successfully and provided ideas and suggestions. We found her support to be very helpful, and it helped us gain a better understanding of how to conduct each playgroup session. We now have a lovely group of regulars who attend our weekly sessions, and we have a lot of fun interacting with the parents and children and finding lots of fun activities to do together. Sarah and I continue to promote the Playgroup through social media and word of mouth.

Within the year, Aaron Vigor, Student Wellbeing and Engagement Leader, obtained donations through the organization 'Good 360'. These donations were then distributed among families associated with the school. The playgroup children received a pair of Nike sandals as well as a special gift of LEGO during Christmas.

The Governing Council has supported the Principal's proposal to outsource the OSHC service at our site. After careful consideration, the YMCA has agreed to provide a shared service between Hackham West Primary School and HHPS-6. The service will be operated from Hackham West Primary School. The Governing Council has agreed that having a service to support our families is beneficial. Parents will be required to drop off and pick up their children from Hackham West Primary School. Together with the Huntfield Heights Primary School P-6, they will provide transportation to and from school, using their bus, at minimal cost to our school.

Throughout the year, the students had the opportunity to participate in various enjoyable activities. One of the most memorable activities was a camping trip to Arbury Park. During their stay at the camp, the students engaged in exciting and informative experiences, such as hiking, learning about Aboriginal culture, fire-making, and cooking. Additionally, mealtimes were a source of fun and bonding for the students. The camping trip allowed the students to form closer relationships with each other, as well as their teachers and support staff.

One of the special activities that the school organized was a school-wide excursion to the Adelaide Zoo. The students had a lot of fun walking through the zoo and viewing the many different animals. Many kids also enjoyed playing in the playground area.

The school year concluded with an amazing end-of-year concert. The concert involved all the classes putting on a performance for their family and friends, with each performance featuring the students dancing to a chosen song. Every student participated, and even the teachers joined in as well. The evening was filled with a lot of fun and laughter, which made it a great event. Then there was the student end of year celebration which was a fun filled day that the Variety Club Sponsored. This enabled the school to hire a variety of jumping castles and arcade games all contained in the gym. Every class including the preschool had the opportunity to enjoy this event which also included pizza for lunch. And let's not forget the graduation ceremony for the students who completed year 6. It was a fantastic celebration to congratulate and bid farewell to the students and wish them well in their next stage of education in high school.



NAPLAN Proficiency



Attendance Comment


In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.


Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

Support of Learning


Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

Relationships and Communication


Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

Leadership and Decision Making


Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)
