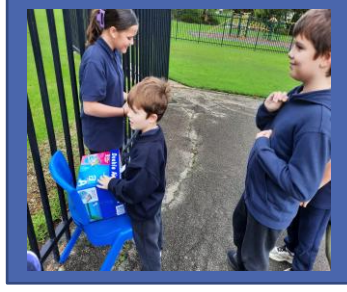

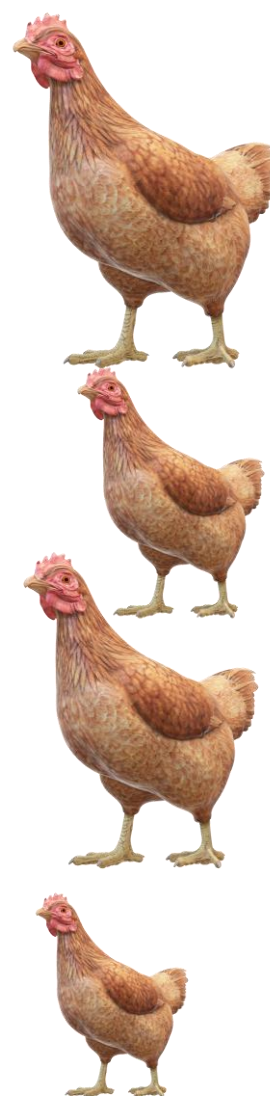

Hatching chickens is an exciting way for students to observe the life cycle of animals, learn about responsibility, and explore scientific concepts firsthand. The process begins by carefully incubating fertile eggs at the right temperature and humidity for 21 days. During this time, eggs are gently turned daily and monitored for healthy development. As hatching day nears, students can watch chicks emerge and witness the early stages of their lives. After hatching, chicks are moved to a warm brooder with food and water. This unforgettable experience helps children connect classroom learning with real-life science while emphasising the importance of animal care and welfare.
